DWEE UPDATE & PUBLIC COMMENTS

No public comments were offered. Chief Water Officer Manning and Director Bradley were unable to attend the meeting; however, Director Bradley passed along a comment that the Legislature's Appropriations Committee has released a preliminary budget report which did not include the spending authority for Water Sustainability Funding although it was in the Governor's recommended budget. Bradley urged Commissioners to discuss the issue with their representatives. Staff will continue to monitor this budget item as it goes through floor debate.

Commissioner Czaplewski requested an update on the Perkins County Canal, to which Commissioner Meyer responded regarding the pending litigation and permitting. Commissioner Meyer noted that the State of Nebraska (Nebraska) filed a case in the United States Supreme Court (Court) in July. How original actions work when one state sues another in the Court, you must first petition the Court to hear the case. Nebraska has asked the Court to take our case against the State of Colorado (Colorado). Colorado has responded and the Court is now giving

the United States Solicitor General (Solicitor) an opportunity to brief the issue and address any other Federal interests that may be involved. Once the Solicitor's Brief is submitted, hopefully by June we will know if the Court will take the case. If the Court decides to take the case, a Special Master will be appointed. Nebraska and Colorado would meet with the Special Master and set a trial schedule. Discovery and the trial would be before the Special Master, then the Special Master's opinion would be submitted to the Supreme Court Justices for their consideration. Regarding permitting, the 404-permit application was submitted last week and is available on the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) website. The USACE has scheduled public open house hearings for March 9 – 11, 2026, in Denver, Julesburg, Kearney plus a virtual option. There will also be an informational open house next week in Ogallala for the public.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Chairman Wilke passed around a listing of the 2025 Committee Members and asked Commissioners to update the list if they would like to be added or removed from a committee.

Chair Wilke stated that the Executive Committee scheduled the following dates for the next four Commission meetings:

- Sept 29th (Tuesday after NRD conference)
- February 17th, 2027

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

No Committee updates were given. Chairman Wilke asked staff to lead discussion on agenda topics pertaining to program activities. No unusual activity was reported.

Resources Development Fund

The status report showed business as usual. Commissioners briefly discussed each project's progress.

Small Watersheds Flood Control Fund

This is currently an unfunded program.

Soil & Water Conservation Program Fund

The status report showed business as usual.

Staff reported meeting last week with NRCS and NARD staff, to review changes to NRCS's 2026 Payment Rate calculations. Two significant changes include use of a per practice base rate with an implementation payment; and a change to the "unit of measurement" for some practices,

such as going from "feet" to "pounds" for pipe costs. Staff discussed issues this creates, and Commissioners may anticipate an action item for this at the April meeting.

Staff also reported the NRD Manager's Partnership Committee is requesting modification of a practice requirement within NC – 16 regarding plan review and approval for Windbreak Renovation. Specifically, the group would like to add the option for either NRCS or NRD staff to review and approve the windbreak renovation plans provided they are trained to do so. Currently only a Forester of the Nebraska Forest Service may review and approve plans.

Batie moved and Czaplewski seconded the motion to modify the NSWCP procedure in practice NC - 16 to allow NRCS and NRD planning staff, trained in farmstead or field windbreak renovation, to review and approve plans.

Chairman Wilke asked if there was additional discussion, there was none offered.

Also, the next round of applications will be received between March 16 – 31, 2026. The Commission will review the outcome of the legislative request for spending authority and determine whether to proceed with application reviews during the April 29th, 2026, NRC meeting.


OTHER BUSINESS & REQUESTS FOR AGENDA ITEMS

- Seven appointed position terms expire May 31, 2026. Commissioners interested in reapplying are encouraged to go to the Governor’s website and do so.
- Commissioner Steffen, and his wife Jolene, were recognized for receiving the 2025 Hugh Hammond Bennett “Producer of the Year” award from the National Conservation Planning Partnership which was presented to them on stage at NACD’s Annual Conference in San Antonio, Texas last week.
- Commissioners 1 – 9 Forms need to be completed and turned in if they have not already done so.
- Next meeting is April 29th, 2026, here in Kearney.

GOVERNOR'S WATER QUALITY AND QUANTITY TASK FORCE

FINAL REPORT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Governor's Water Quality and Quantity Task Force has developed a comprehensive set of recommendations aimed at protecting Nebraska's water resources statewide, through a Final Report.

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Increased statewide water measurement through voluntary efforts and cost-share opportunities
- Development of statewide education materials and increased individual engagements with producers
- Development of a nitrogen management education and certification program for fertilizer recommendations
- Promotion of in-season nitrate applications and advanced nutrient-management technologies
- Proactive drinking water system protections and identification of regionalization opportunities
- Development of a statewide clearing house identifying water project needs and funding opportunities
- Leverage diverse funding mechanisms, including ONE RED

Collectively, the implementation of the goals and actions that have been developed through this effort will serve to sharpen the focus of important water quality and quantity outcomes for the State.

BACKGROUND

The Task Force convened in the Spring of 2025 and was made up of members representing a cross-section of industries, businesses, and other relevant expertise.

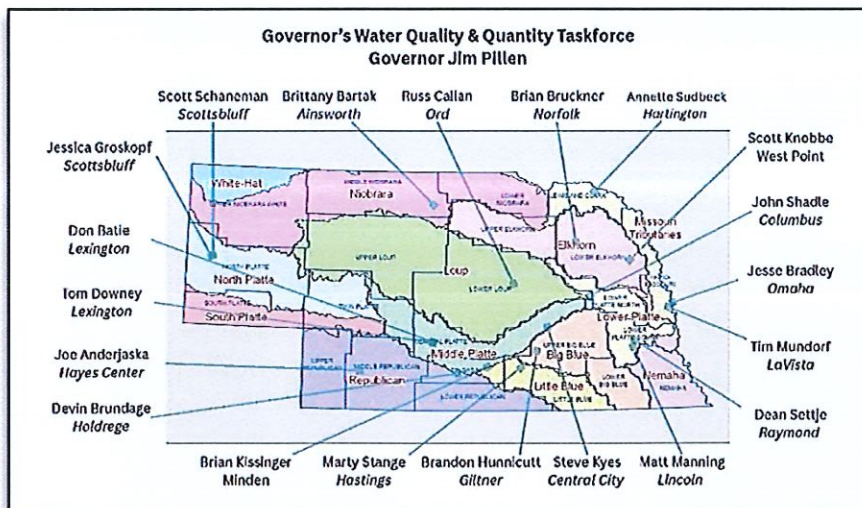
Through four subcommittees, 20 members worked to develop actionable solutions to protect and preserve Nebraska's vital water resources for consideration by the Governor.

Members participated in monthly discussions and received presentations from subject-matter experts, allowing them to develop a shared understanding of the issues and identify goals and corresponding action items.

The Task Force prioritized incentives, innovation, and education over new regulatory requirements.

Subcommittees:

1. Water Conservation and Quantity
2. Methods and Resources
3. Nitrate Legacy and Drinking Water Access
4. Financing and Incentives

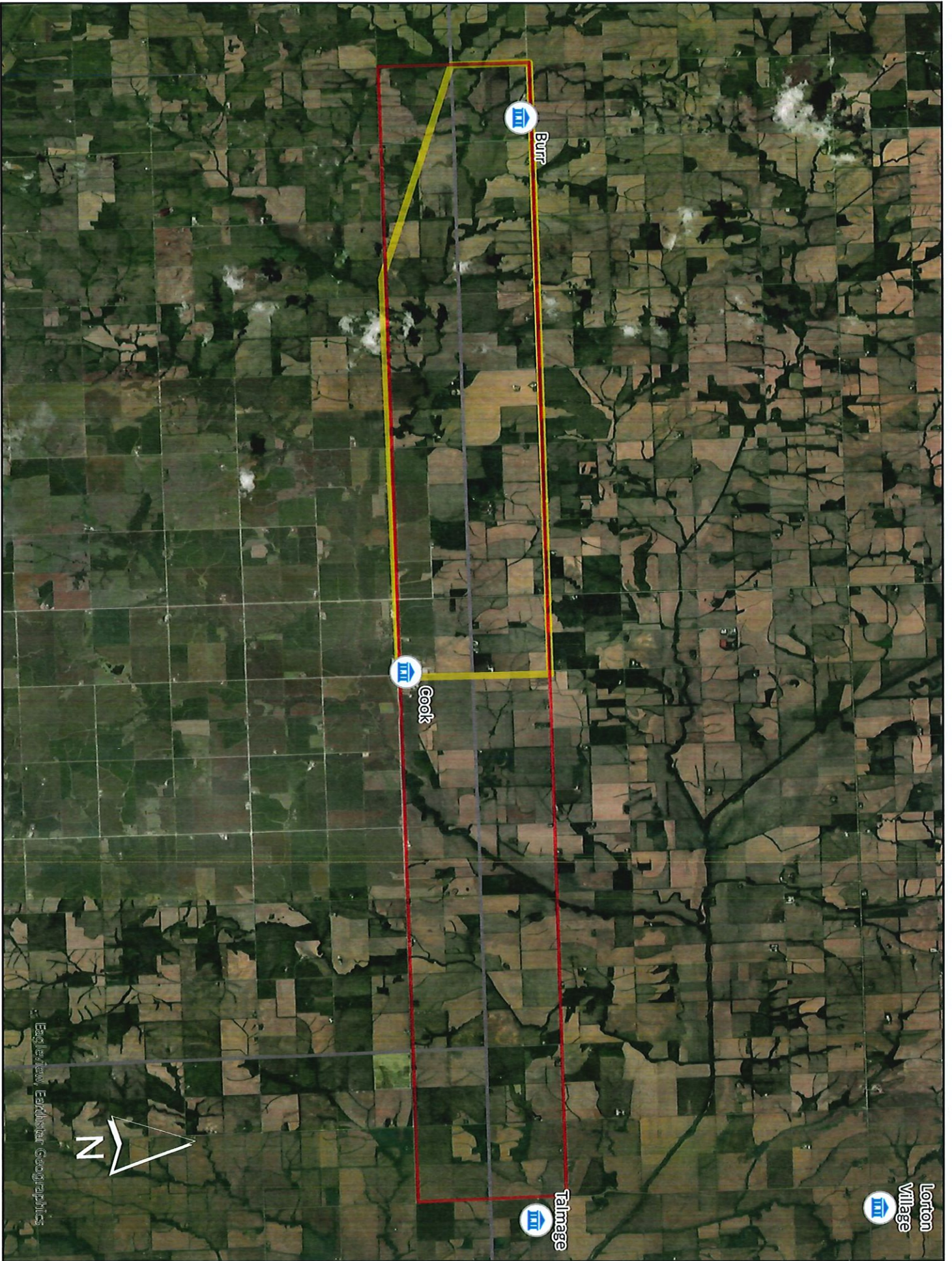
